Residency Requirement

Students in the Ph.D. program are expected to establish "residency" by **attending school full time for the first 30 hours of the program** to formulate their research agenda and work with faculty on research, supervision, teaching, and extramural funding.

During residency, students are encouraged to build professional relationships and engage in activities that enhance their professional development, such as attending dissertation defenses, workshops, colloquia, or symposia on campus and in the Metro Atlanta area. Students may collaborate on faculty research projects, assist with instructional programs for master's degree students, and learn to design and write grants for external funding.

Graduate teaching assistantships or graduate research assistantships may be available to eligible students during the first three years of study and provide a minimum of **\$2,500 per semester**. Through these competitive assignments, students seeking a meaningful mentoring experience work with their faculty mentors on projects that increase their skills, confidence, awareness, and overall competence in academia, specifically in areas of teaching, research, supervision, leadership, advocacy, and counseling.

Admission to Program

Applicants seeking admission to the program must have a master's degree in counseling or a counseling discipline from a college or university accredited by an institutional accreditor recognized by the U.S. Department of Education with a minimum 3.5 graduate GPA. Preference is given to graduates of CACREPaccredited programs.
